Members of the Medical Women's International Association, colleagues in public health,
Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am honoured to address the participants in this 28th MWIA International Congress, an international group of women doctors. Founded in 1919, the Medical Women's International Association (MWIA) is one of the oldest professional groups with a focus on women. MWIA members come from all five continents, including a large membership from the African continent. When I took office in early 2007, I made the health of women and of the people of Africa two of my top priorities.

MWIA has been a long and valued partner for WHO on a number of projects. Most recently, the Association contributed to the development of a training manual for health managers on gender mainstreaming. I hope you will contribute to the reference group for the development of a module on clinical care which WHO is developing as part of this package.

In November 2009, WHO released its first comprehensive report on »Women and health: today's evidence, tomorrow's agenda«. The evidence it contains is compelling. The report highlights the contribution made by women as caregivers in the home and as professionals working in health services. As shown, up to 80 % of all health care and 90 % of care for HIV/AIDS-related illness is provided in the home – almost always by women. As societies age, women will become even more important as caregivers on the frontline. Yet more often than not, women caregivers go unsupported, unrecognized and unremunerated in this essential role. Furthermore, women tend to be concentrated in occupations that may be considered to have lower status – such as nursing, midwifery and community health services. As men continue to dominate among doctors and dentists, women are a minority among the highly trained professionals. Typically, more than 70 % of doctors are male while more than 70 % of nurses are female – a marked gender imbalance.

Health systems need not fail women. The global report on women and health presents a body of work to advance women's health and gender equality. The agenda for action it proposes is one that should engage us all. The hard work of women doctors earns my full respect, and I congratulate MWIA on giving associations of women doctors around the world a consolidated voice.

I wish you constructive deliberations, particularly in your plenary session on gender strategies, and in the corridors. As WHO takes the women and health agenda forward, we will be counting on your input, views, and experiences at the frontline of care. After all, compassion and care are hallmark traits of what it means to be a woman, anywhere, everywhere.

Dear Participants,

on behalf of the head of the Westphalian Wilhelms University (WWU), I welcome you to the 28th International Congress of the Medical Women's International Association.

Female networking and the improvement of women's professional and academic perspective is not only one of the mile stones in our university's mission statement. It is also my personal belief as a female scientist and female rector that networking among women must yet be intensified.

The WWU Münster considers equality for men and women to be a task of strategic importance. Our aim is to ease the combination of an academic career and family interests for women – and men. It is in addition with the high quality of life offered by the Münster region that the University hopes to reap benefits in recruiting brilliant researchers in the future. WWU's second strategic objective in the field of gender mainstreaming is to apply suitable measures to strengthen women's perspectives in pursuing academic careers. As a university, we see our assignment in concrete measures because actions speak louder than words.

Since 2000 the WWU has been running an internal equality programme, with an annual budget of € 200,000, which supports women in their academic activities. The University runs a training programme which is tailored to supporting young women researchers with respect to their academic careers. In addition, we are currently designing a training programme to promote female careers in university management. The WWU sets up its own facilities where the children of academic staff can be looked after all day; there is a special focus on children under 3. The WWU offers a flexible and speedy service organizing childcare, for example in cases of weekend seminars or in emergencies. A holiday-programme for school-children is provided, too. Last but not least, assistance is being planned for supervising schoolchildren while they do their homework.

But let me draw your attention to a last point which is also important for any kind of network: It was once said that Münster has as many churches as pubs. But this is no longer true. Since there are about 50.000 students in Münster, the list of taverns on different websites vary from 661 to 717 of them. I am afraid that the tight programme of this congress will not give you the opportunity to visit all of them. But a fistful of them should be a must. So I hope you will enjoy the meeting and gain new hints and insights for your career and studies. Perhaps this short stay will give you a positive impression of the university – and I would be very happy if I could welcome you in Münster later on. I wish you an exciting and fruitful stay at our University and in the city of Münster in this respect, too.

The latin word medicina is female. Medicine needs to be more female. As our faculty's statistics show both statements hold their own truth: Around 70 % of our 3000 enrolled students are women. However, if one follows the professional careers, the percentage of women is decreasing: Out of 300 doctorates which are turned in at our faculty, 54 % are written by women. When it comes to the so-called habilitations (assoc. Professor), the quota of women drops down to 32 % and concerning professorships even to 20 %.

Gender researchers call this phenomenon the »leaky-pipeline«: When a pipeline leaks it is not because of the oil, but because of the structural weakness of the pipe. This means that the professional career of excellent and qualified female physicians fails due to shortcomings in the university structure – yet structures can be changed.

Although the above-named numbers exceed the average, they are not satisfactory. A lot of work needs to be done in order to rise above a male-dominated medicine.

This renders »gender strategies« an important subject of this year's congress with its main focus on globalization. The Medical Faculty at the Westfälische Wilhelms-Universität Münster is proud that the organizers decided for Münster as location for the 28th International Congress and we are pleased that after 30 years this important event will be taking place in Germany again.

We would like to take this occasion to thank the »German Medical Women's Association« (DÄB), the local organizing team, as well as all supporters and participants. Münster is more than a touristic site; it is a landmark in university medicine in Germany. We kindly invite you to visit our »Studienhospital Münster« to get an impression of our faculty's work and achievements.

We hope that all participants will have a pleasant stay here in Münster and take home new inspirations – and that there will be enough time to visit the centre of our wonderful city with all its cultural highlights.
